SafeHouse Denver's New **Extended Stay Program**... Your Opportunity to Support Short-Term Housing and Continued Services for Survivors of Domestic Violence



The Need..

Since its founding as an emergency shelter for battered women in 1977, SafeHouse Denver has been dedicated to providing the highest quality of domestic violence prevention and intervention services to the Denver community. With the addition of a non-residential

Counseling and Advocacy Center (CAC) in 1993 and an ongoing focus on community education and outreach to those at high-risk of domestic violence, **SafeHouse Denver is the only agency in the City and County of Denver that provides both safe shelter and non-residential services.** As we approach our 40th Anniversary in 2017, we're proud to take the next step in ensuring that those ready to leave the shelter have access to the short-term housing and continued services that are critical to creating a safe, self-sufficient future for themselves and their children. With the future opening of an Extended Stay Program (ESP) facility, our longtime strategic vision for a **continuum of care will become a reality.**

ur emergency shelter is designed to serve victims in immediate crisis with an intended length of stay of 30 days. As our **safety-driven philosophy** allows families to apply for extensions, in reality, we are implementing an extended stay program in our shelter right now.

The lack of safe, affordable housing is the greatest barrier facing survivors of domestic violence seeking to leave an abusive relationship. In Metro Denver, multi-year waitlists for Section 8 or other government housing, high rental rates, competition for units, and high occupancy rates can be insurmountable challenges.

...The Impact of Your Support



• ESP will help **reduce homelessness** in our community and ensure a brighter future for domestic violence survivors and their children.

• **Families** will have a safe environment and more time to access long-term housing, employment, childcare and other self-sufficiency-related resources.

The individual units available through ESP will provide

families with more privacy and independence as they work toward self-sufficiency.

- The availability of safe housing and ongoing support services will be critical to a survivor's overall physical and emotional health, as well as their ability to heal from the abuse they've endured.
- The continued support and services available through ESP will lower the risk of children becoming victims or abusers later in their lives. Studies show that more than 60% of children who have experienced family violence go on to repeat this pattern.

Project Overview

- SafeHouse Denver's ESP will be housed in a 6 to 8 unit apartment building in a safe Denver neighborhood with good access to public transportation. Our goal is to purchase the building with cash, thus avoiding any debt. Greenwood Village-based Gold Crown Management will help us identify and secure a building when all funds are raised.
- We estimate the cost of purchasing, renovating and furnishing a building to be \$1M. The Anschutz Foundation has approved a \$200K conditional grant to be funded when all other funds are raised. Our capital fundraising efforts are targeting individual donors, as well as companies and foundation funders.
- Potential ESP occupants will be selected through a thoughtful and competitive process in an effort to maximize individual and overall program success. All applicants must have a clearly documented plan for self-sufficiency which will be reviewed and approved by the Director of Shelter Services and the ESP Case Manager.

- Only SafeHouse Denver Shelter residents who are employed or receiving Temporary Assistance to Needy Families (TANF) and Medicaid and on transitional housing or other types of housing-related waiting lists may apply.
- The anticipated length of stay will be one to four months with longer periods possible on a case by case basis.
- The property will be professionally managed by Gold Crown Management on a pro bono basis.

Specific Service Components

- Safe, secure, rent-free, independent living in fullyfurnished studio or one bedroom apartments with easy access to public transportation.
- A two-week supply of basic necessities such as toiletries and grocery staples, as well as bus tokens, to help residents make the immediate transition into the ESP.
- On-site ESP Case Manager, offering individual counseling, support groups, advocacy services and referral to self-sufficiency-related resources through SafeHouse Denver's Counseling and Advocacy Center and a host of other community partners. Services will be offered on-site at the ESP facility, at our CAC and offsite at partner agencies.
